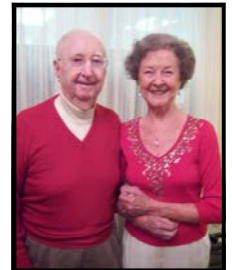

Lib and I had such a pleasant visit with the Rooneys. They moved into their apartment in Building 6 on December 15, 2011. They knew about Still Hopes many years ago having known members of the Guignard family.

Russell gives credit for their move to his wife and old age. She thought about needing assistance as they grew older. They have friends here who must have had the same idea.

Russell was born in Charleston, attended school there, and graduated from the Citadel in 1937 with a degree in Civil Engineering. He served his country during WW II in the islands of the Pacific Theater. His unit received orders to go overseas on December 7, 1941, Pearl Harbor Day. They freed civilian internees in Manila and were scheduled to invade Japan when the atomic bomb ended the war. He returned home after VJ Day.

After the war he returned to Columbia and formed a property and casualty insurance company. A few years later he was joined by a partner, Palmer McArthur, and the company became Rooney and McArthur. He sold his company to the salesman when he was 78 years old. It is now known as Keenan and Suggs.

Norma was born in Columbia and met Russell on a blind date. They have been married since 1948. Norma studied Interior Design and worked with Dora Gray Studio.

Russell plays golf with his friends Ed Hickman and Frank Dana, who live here at Still Hopes.

Norma is a collector of antiques and thereby lies a story. She appeared on Antiques Road Show when the popular television production visited Charleston. She is a celebrity! She had an antique inlaid card table appraised. It was made in England, circa 1790. They donated the table to the Columbia Museum of Art.

They have traveled extensively in Europe and Asia.

Russell says Still Hopes is a remarkable place. The maintenance of the property is fantastic. He and Norma have never met such nice people in management. Dining in the bistro has been most pleasant as they enjoy food that is "more like home cooking."

Russell and I ended the interview talking about our boyhood days spent on salt water in the low country. The Rooneys are most genial. Please get to know them. Norma would love to tell you about her antiques. ❖

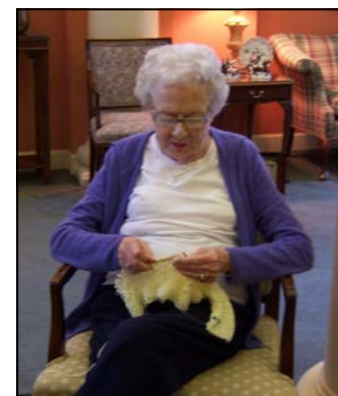

The second project was to make surgery caps for children. The knitting group made many different

surgery caps in various colors and patterns so each child would be able to pick a favorite. The Knitting group was able to donate 49 dolls and 29 surgery caps. STATEBURG HISTORY TOUR and the Church of the Holy Cross ~ Coming in March

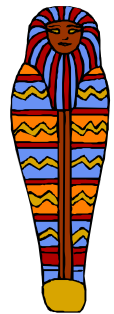

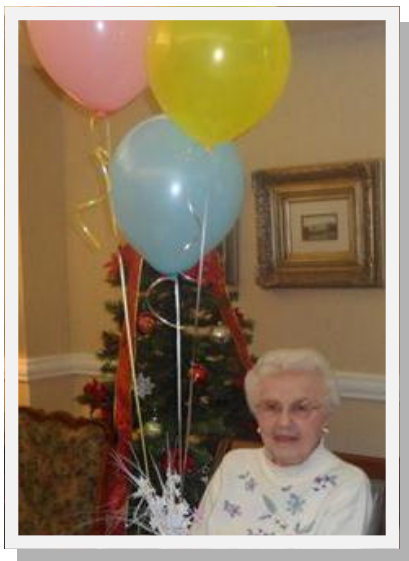
