Croquet Court & Pavilion A GIFT OF HEALTH AND WELLNESS

While I have talked a good deal about the upcoming croquet court and pavilion, I continue to get a good many questions from residents and friends of Still Hopes about it, so I thought it may be a good idea to share

some of the details in an article, for all to be able to see and to refer back to. Not many months ago, our Director of Wellness conducted a survey among all the apartment and cottage residents about what outdoor sport they would like to see at Still Hopes. The outdoor sport that received the most votes, by a considerable margin, was croquet, receiving 42% of the votes. The other sports tested, along with their

While I have talked a good deal percentage votes, are as follows: bocce ball with 25%, about the upcoming croquet badminton with 20%, and pickleball with 13%.

Soon after this survey was completed, Ms. Susan Boyd began to talk with me about gifting a croquet court and pavilion to Still Hopes, and over the course of about a year the decision was finalized by Susan to make the donation. This idea was then taken to the Still Hopes Board of Trustees who voted to accept the gift and to allocate space for the court and its pavilion on the 1-acre lot at the entrance gate to Still Hopes. This lot is not a part of the memorial forest.

The pavilion will be constructed such that it will be secured when not in use, and to be as easy to maintain *Continued on page 3*





and to clean as is possible. The pavilion will also provide space to sit in the shade, under a ceiling fan, while waiting for court time, will provide two restrooms that are fully accessible under the ADA codes, and will have some space for making coffee or hot chocolate or even for a cookout when appropriate. The court itself will be built to regulation size and standards with a complex underturf drainage system in place. It will use artificial turf, thereby all but eliminating the need for routine maintenance. As with other projects undertaken by the Boyd Family, this project is being professionally designed at present, and will be professionally constructed. The court and pavilion will be a nice addition to the campus, will be aesthetically pleasing at our front entrance, and will provide a sport that seniors are "rediscovering" across the South and one that nearly all older adults can play as they age, even after they find other outdoor sports to be too strenuous. I would anticipate that the court can be completed in the next 6 to 8 months, but the design work is, at present, still in process.

Bishop Gadsden, the Episcopal Retirement Community in Charleston, has had their court open for about 2 years now, and the only "problem" they have encountered is that the residents have trouble getting a court time for play. They are eager for us to get our court up and operating, so these two communities can have social interactions with tournament play. It is also rumored that the Episcopal Deerfield Retirement Community in Asheville is building a court as well, so we can potentially have three Episcopal Retirement



Communities moving along the I-26 corridor to play tournaments in what should prove to be a very socially engaging sport that enhances coordination and balance, but does not results any significant number of injuries.



Still Hopes Thrives Through Your Vision & Generosity

We may know of the resident, family, and community gifts that created the Chapel of the Holy Spirit, the Shearouse Wellness Center, and Main Street. We feel our gratitude for them every day. Are you aware of the quieter resident gifts that bring Still Hopes to life all around you?

- Several years ago, three residents saw that the Guignard Mansion lawn and gardens needed a boost. They planned, purchased, and planted ,bringing a new garden to life. In the course of their work, they learned that the irrigation system was aging and in poor repair. They made a gift to replace it.
- After hearing of and seeing the sagging condition of Still Hopes's guest apartment in the McDowell Building, a resident felt something should be done. They quietly came forward offering to fund decorating services and a renovation.
- A resident who cherished Jane Bruce Guignard's gift of the forest realized that a topographical survey of the property would aide its maintenance and growth. They provided funds not just for the survey but to support other forest needs as well.
- Just this year, a resident recognized that the prayer kneelers in the Chapel of the Holy Spirit were wearing thin. This resident contacted a needlepoint designer, obtained an estimate, and with the help of Development, set about raising funds and gathering needleworkers from across the campus. The project has become hugely popular, reaching the target, moving ahead of schedule, and capturing the spirit of residents and staff alike.
- Also this year, a group of residents who mourned a dearly departed friend decided to honor his memory with something that captured his generous, outgoing, fun-loving spirit. A concert by the Ross Holmes Band would mirror a gift that he and his wife had happily given earlier in the year. With assistance from Life Engagement and Development, a target amount was chosen to cover the cost. Appeals were made to friends and neighbors. The idea spread and was so popular that the group raised twice their target. The concert took place Oct. 11th with

200 residents in attendance, and the group is planning future endeavors.

Several residents find value and pleasure in gifting Still Hopes with special guests, concerts, artwork, flowers, yarn ... year after year. Some chip in for repairs, or understand the value of an occasional gift to our unrestricted fund to protect residents' monthly fees from bearing the burden of unexpected expenses.

In 2022, residents, friends and family raised over \$50,000 for the Resident Assistance Fund through memorial and honorary gifts alone (not counting other gifts to the fund). In fact, your gifts have contributed approximately \$3.9 million over the fund's lifetime, most of which has been used.

In 2022, residents and staff contributed over \$45,000 to the Chaplain's Discretionary and Employee Assistance Funds (not to be confused with the resident-run Employee Appreciation Fund) to help employees in financial need. The top four needs served were mortgage and rent payments, electric bills, and car repairs. Those gifts helped over 75 employees remain in their homes, stay warm, and continue driving (including to work!).

To say that we are grateful would be an understatement. In this month of gratitude, we offer a heartfelt thank-you for all of your gifts, including your gifts of imagination, heart, and your desire to make a difference. As we meet the end of the year, I wonder, what are you inspired to? That vision shapes Still Hopes and what we become for future generations of residents and staff.

In the coming weeks, you will receive an Introduction To Still Hopes Development which tells the story of how giving has and can shape the place we call home. Please take a look. If you



are so moved, let's talk about your vision – as an individual, couple, or group – and how we can bring your vision to life now or in the future.
