Michael Amiridis became 30th president of the University of South Carolina on July 1, 2022. Before coming home to Carolina, he led the University of Illinois Chicago as its chancellor since 2015. Prior to leading USC, Amiridis spent more than two decades at our Columbia campus as a faculty member and administrator, serving from 2009 to 2015 as the university's executive vice president for academic affairs and provost.

As a researcher, Amiridis earned the National Science Foundation's award for early-career scientists and engineers in 1999, was elected a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2012, and was elected a fellow of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers in 2015.

He and his wife, Ero, are the parents of two children who are both graduates of the University of South Carolina.







Trenholm Artists Guild Show Coming to Still Hopes in August

Members of Trenholm Artists Guild are excited to have its fourteenth show at Still Hopes Episcopal Retirement Community! With 115 members, the show is bound to include excellent artwork. Members are drawn to enter this show because of the great exhibit space, potential to win an award, and the love and appreciation of the staff and residents of Still Hopes.

Sarah Herlong's acrylic painting, *Sarah Takes Flight*, won the Best of Show Award in the 2023 exhibition. In her artist's statement, Sarah said that, for most of her forties, she took care of her mother who had a rare neurological disorder. As her mother entered hospice, she could not imagine her role in life as anything but a caregiver. The self-portrait is an exuberant display of hope with the Carolina Wren as a symbol of rebirth and the Yellow Jasmine as a symbol of happiness.

Christine Swann of Greenville, SC, has agreed to judge the show. While she works primarily in pastels, she also paints in oil, acrylic, and watercolor.

Although she originally started out by painting her children by bribing them with candy, she now works with live models. Known for her "personality portraits," she started as an illustrator and is now an international award-winning artist, having won the IAPS Best of Show "Prix de Pastel" Masters Circle Exhibition award in 2020 and in 2015. Her pastel, "Impact," won Honorable Mention in the portrait category in the 2023 Artist Magazine Competition. She also has won awards at the Pastel Society of America's International Exhibition in New York, and her award-winning portrait is currently on display at the Butler Museum of American Art. Her work has also traveled internationally, including to the 2nd China (Suzhou) Biennial International Pastel Exhibition.

Christine won "Outstanding Pastel" in the BoldBrush Competition for four years in a row. Her work received fifth place in the Portrait Society of America Member's Competition in 2015 and a finalist in 2019 and 2021. In the Fall of 2022, her body of work in oils, "Broken Vessels," was shown at a solo exhibition in Pittsburgh, PA.

Christine is a Signature Member of the Pastel Society of America, and a member of the IAPS Masters' Circle, a designation she received in only six years. She received her Eminent Distinction in 2022. She is also a long time member of the Pittsburgh Society of Illustrators, and she currently teaches her "Power of Pastel" workshop to groups around the country and writes a blog every week on art, pastels, and motherhood. She is happily living and teaching from her studio at the Greenville Center for Creative Arts in Greenville, South Carolina.



The show will include all two-dimensional media created by amateur and professional artists. Still Hopes residents and staff members, as well as others who attend the reception and awards ceremony (scheduled for Thursday, August 8, 5-6:30 PM), are invited to vote for their selection for the coveted People's Choice award. The exhibit will hang in the Hopewell Gallery and Emilie's Café through September 28.





Soon after, she learned that her daughter and three friends had nominated her to carry the Olympic torch on its way to the 2002 Winter Olympic Games in Salt Lake City, Utah. Now officially selected to take on that task, Nancy's personal Olympic adventure began.

The history and tradition of the Olympic torch is as rich and historic as the Games themselves. First appearing at the ancient Greek Olympics in the 4th century BCE, it remains lit throughout the entire competition. The practice of

transporting the lit flame from Greece to the site of the contemporary event was instituted in the mid-



20th century. The year 2000 marked the 50th anniversary of the torch being incorporated into the Winter Olympics. From the beginning to the end of its journey, the 32.5" tall torch was carried in 2001-2 by runners, skiers, motor vehicles, aircraft, specially built trains, bicycles, boats and canoes. It was crafted in metal, silver, copper and

glass, topped by a live flame. In 2001-2, the flame's first stop in the US was Atlanta, Georgia. South Carolina was its second locale. The torch's route to Utah consisted of traveling through 46 states and 300 towns. In 2002 the design, fitting the theme of

winter, was of a stalactite, embossed with the Game's motto "Light the Fire Within". The total run took 65 days and covered 13,500

Torch bearers for 2002 were selected by Olympic sponsors and organizers. Persons must have made a "significant contribution to the community and personify the theme of the Olympics." And Nancy fit those criteria. Born and raised in Columbia, she had been active in many

community and civic activities, as well as Trinity Church (now Cathedral). She calls herself an "Olympic devotee", making two in-person visits [Los Angeles and Atlantal to watch the competitions,



especially those in track and field. Enormously honored to be a part of Olympic history, she hoisted the eleven pound symbol from the residential area of Five Points to what is now Martin Luther King Park. Not surprisingly, Nancy aced it!

At age 38, raising her two daughters, continuing her volunteer work and high school teaching, Nancy discovered the joys of marathon running. She had done other team sports but found new purpose in running solo. Nancy went on to participate in the first Disney Marathon in Florida, the Marine

Corps Marathon in DC and the Carolina Marathon [now defunct], which went from downtown Columbia to West Columbia. "That one was the hardest," she recollects, as she discovered hills in her home town she had not been



aware of! Nancy's husband, who passed away in 2000, was very supportive, often driving her to the starting point of the races and cheering from the sidelines.

Now content to limit her physical activities to the Still Hopes Wellness Center and to as much walking as possible, Nancy looks back with honor and pleasure at her Olympic accomplishment. It however is only one of her achievements, having earned her doctorate degree in secondary education somewhere in between races. And then there's the two-day trek, traversing the hills and dales of the Grand Canyon, which she did with her daughter.

In 2001-2 there were 12,000 torch bearers in total, transporting the sacred symbol from Atlanta to Salt Lake City. Some were celebrities such as Darius Rucker, Troy Aikman, Loretta Lynn. and Nancy Dunbar.


